

PRIMARY NEWS

Year 4 is STEMsational

"...but why?" is certainly a question we have all heard children ask and has become one of my favourite questions to hear. "Why" is at the heart and spirit of inquisitive thinking. Encouraging our students to ask questions, to wonder, and to explore is fundamental to fostering their curiosity and igniting their passion for learning. Every child is a natural investigator, eager to unravel the mysteries of God's creation. Which is exactly what we have been doing in Science as we explore the concept of melting and freezing.

This term we have used demonstrations and experiments to capture students' imagination and provide them with an opportunity to explore why substances behave the way they do. We have lifted an ice cube on a string. We have expanded our vocabulary to include the word 'viscosity' and experimented with how we can alter the viscosity of a substance. Later, students agreed that having a dependent and independent variable would help us make better observations when we froze honey, rubbing alcohol and oil.



Naturally, all of this science understanding was applied later on when we made Rocky Road. We have loved learning about how different elements behave and at what temperature they might melt or boil (yes! we have discussed atoms and molecules in year 4!). All this in the first half of Term 1, which is only possible when you have a group of keen and enthusiastic learners.



Introducing Mr Bowtell to OAGS

At the beginning of this term, we were fortunate to welcome Mr Bowtell to OAGS. Having spent some time last year becoming acquainted with OAGS and many of our Primary students whilst completing a teaching practicum, Mr Bowtell is now teaching Christian Studies across our Primary School. I recently interviewed Mr Bowtell to find out a bit more about him.

What do you love about teaching Christian Studies?

I get to spend every day exploring God's Word in the Bible through a range of media and crafts. I can't think of a better way to spend my time.

What has impressed you in your first few weeks at OAGS?

The children's engagement and questions have been inspirational. I feel blessed to have the opportunity to grow with them through what can be really challenging ideas. Furthermore, the staff and their passion for what they do in all aspects of the school has been a powerful model for myself.



What opportunities do you see in teaching Christian Studies to our Primary students at OAGS?

As students become more engaged in God's message, I have been encouraging them to find their own answers, to seek their own knowledge in the Bible. Guiding them back to the good news in Jesus Christ, I see this as an opportunity for them to build their foundations of an ongoing journey with support from God's word.

What is something most people wouldn't know about you?

I wasn't a great student myself. I would often be distracted or have unfinished work which frustrated most teachers. I believe this has put me in a position to understand and help students who need extra guidance when not connecting with schoolwork.

Thank you Mr Bowtell. Coupled with your passion for our lunchtime CRU ministry, you are clearly being instrumental in pointing our students to the light that is Jesus Christ. No doubt, with your dedication and wisdom, our Primary School community will continue to flourish as we wrestle with the truth of the gospel.

Secondary Study Skills Seminars

Good study skills can increase your confidence, competence, and self-esteem. They can also reduce anxiety about tests and deadlines. Last week students in years 7, 9, 11 and 12 participated in study skill seminars to help them to establish healthy study habits at the start of the school year. Whilst each year group will spend time discussing this topic at key moments during stage meetings, these seminars are designed to provide year specific information that relates to their specific stage.

Thank you to our year 7 students: Isaac Lee, Molly Spicer and Sophie Harris who wrote a fantastic reflection below:

On Tuesday the 27th, The students of OAGS High School were honoured to attend a seminar on study skills, which provided them with invaluable tools to enhance their productivity while studying. The seminar was conducted by Kate from Elevate Education, who shared new study techniques to streamline students' study practices and enable them to reach their full potential. Throughout the seminar, the students were equipped with effective note-taking skills and learned how to memorise complex information using trigger words, mind maps, and other techniques. This event was designed to help students study more effectively, thus enabling them to achieve academic success. The students and faculty alike appreciate the time and effort that went into organising such a valuable experience.

Some of our Year 9 students wrote in their evaluation at the end of the seminar:

"I think that this was a great program that I will definitely incorporate into my study time."

Getting to know our HSIE Coordinator

At the start of this year Mr St. Julian became the inaugural Coordinator of HSIE faculty in the secondary school. Whilst he has been a valued member of staff for sometime, he now has the important role of leading this faculty as the school continues to flourish and grow. I took a few minutes earlier out of Mr St. Julian's day, to hear how he is settling in and get to know him better.

What did you do prior to training as a teacher?

Prior to becoming a teacher, I studied archaeology at Sydney University and I spent many years working on archaeological sites in Australia and Cambodia. I was a member of the Sydney University Greater Angkor Project, which investigated the rise and demise of the Khmer Empire, which once occupied most of mainland South-East Asia. Our work pioneered the use of ultraviolet satellite photography and LiDAR to locate archaeological sites, ultimately leading to the discovery of the lost capital of Mahendraparvata in the Kulen Hills. The archaeological research also revealed the sophisticated nature of Khmer Hydrology and engineering, as well the impact of unsustainable water engineering upon low-density urbanisation. This work led me to writing a number of books for Cambridge University Press and I also lectured at the University of New South Wales for a couple of years. I am still involved with Sydney University's archaeological research and I continue to write for Cambridge University.

What do you love about teaching History?

Essentially, the purpose of History is to make sense of the past from the various scraps of information that have survived, whether it is written evidence, archaeological material or other sources of information. I love putting together



the different pieces of evidence to reconstruct the past, similar to a Detective investigating a crime. My Year 12 Ancient History class is currently investigating the possible reasons for the assassination of a Roman politician named Tiberius Sempronius Gracchus: it's great delving into the differing evidence and trying to produce an explanation that encompasses all the material, whilst successfully explaining why certain contradictory details may be excluded from the reconstruction.

I enjoy the debate associated with so much of history. Some students become frustrated with history as they want a 'black and white' explanation, but I try to remind them that life is messy and rarely do things happen in a 'black and white' manner. I love showing students how to read evidence and extract information for their own reconstruction of the past. Again, some students can be frustrated by the debatable nature of history, often saying: 'just tell me the correct answer.' I reply that my job is not to tell them what to think or what the correct answer is, but to show them how to use the evidence: I won't mark a student on their interpretation, rather I will mark them according to their use of evidence and the depth of their analysis. It's wonderful to see a student develop their own clearly articulated interpretation of history that is substantiated with appropriate evidence and critical explanation.

What has impressed you in your first few weeks in your leadership of the HSIE faculty?

'Hashtag Blessed' seems to be a popular expression at the moment and I would hate for anyone to mistakenly think that I was a regular user of contemporary vernacular phraseology, but I feel truly blessed by my colleagues in the HSIE faculty. Each of them bring passion, dedication and in-depth knowledge to the subjects that they teach. It is wonderful to hear the enthusiasm and engagement Mrs Foster promotes in her Geography and History classes. Mrs Kimmins' Banana Mummifications captivated the Year 7s, whilst the blood and guts flow profusely in her Stage 5 Elective History 'Assassinations' unit. Mr van der Merwe is to be applauded for his dedication to all things Financial and Mrs Brown is the doyenne of the mediaeval world: the students may not currently appreciate her devotion to Monty Python, but in years to come, they will. Each member of the faculty brings unique skills and insights that enliven their classes, and I am grateful for their collegiality and passion.

What are you most looking forward to in Semester 1?

I have some wonderful classes and I am really enjoying working through a wide variety of topics, such as Charlemagne, Periclean Athens, Stalinist Russia and Tiberius Gracchus. More broadly, I am looking forward to working with my HSIE colleagues: we have started overhauling the Geography programmes and we are working on a range of new activities and assessment tasks.

Thanks Mr St. Julian for your time. We are fortunate to have such a professional, dedicated and passionate teacher here at OAGS. We look forward to your leadership of HSIE and are so grateful for the positive impact we have already seen in your first month.

Competing against some exceptional heifers presented by Murrumburrah High, our students also battled the elements as the heavens opened during Charloais judging - not easy presenting white cattle in pouring rain!

Our students also took on a huge field of exhibitors in the Limousin section on behalf of our sponsors Elberta Limousins collecting second and third place in a highly competitive section.

The paraders division was the toughest competition of the show with over 180 students competing for honours in the school's division. Harvest Season at OAGS

Harvest festival is celebrated in many cultures as a time to be grateful for the bounty provided by the land we care for, and at the ACE academy, late summer is one of our peak harvest times as students gather a range of foods from honey and eggs to figs and lamb.

The honey collection and prime lamb projects are being undertaken by Year 10 Agriculture (200 hours). These are a key feature of the Project Based Learning in the Farm Business Management unit currently being undertaken. All produce at the school is graded and marketed by the students and quickly snapped up providing funds which are reinvested into the Agriculture program. This week the first shipment of prime lambs were delivered to happy customers throughout the school as cutlets, chops, roasts and sausages. The honey collected from changed out frames was also available for sale, while the group have commenced refining the wax collected to make a range

OAGS Swimming Carnival

This year the Multiclass level was recognised as individual events, this is great as it allows for opportunities to be created for students who may need accommodations to participate. To swim in these events a student must have a classification given to them from the head organisations of that sport, in this case Swimming Australia. This year the swimming carnival assembly needed to be broken into two separate events. Primary were awarded their Age Champion, Reserve Champion and record breaker certificates first as well as finding out the winning House. The Secondary Swim team had a very quick turn around and headed off to the WAS swimming carnival held at Kinross the Friday following the carnival. We took our largest team ever and the results did not disappoint! 22 students are eligible to attend the AICES swimming championships on Friday the 5th April, a wonderful development for swimming in Secondary.
