#### Year 4 - 'The Thing About Oliver'

"Sometimes I feel just like the glass in my fish tank - people look right through me."

'The Thing About Oliver' is an appealing, although heart-wrenching, story for children told through the voice of twelve-year-old Tilly. It seems as though her life and needs are always in second place to the urgent demands of her eight-year-old brother, Oliver, who has autism.

Integrating much of our Year 4 English curriculum this term, 'The Thing About Oliver' explores themes such as tested family relationships, perseverance and compassion, all whilst weaving in symbolism such as water and glass, exploring the relationship between the observer and the observed. Tilly is on the outside looking into her 'fish tank', a world she desperately wants to be part of but feels as though it is out of her reach.




But Tilly is smart, strong, empathetic and incredibly resourceful. She is wise beyond her years – doing far more than most children her age in order to support her struggling mother. Despite not always liking her brother who has endless violent tantrums, her love for him is boundless, unconditional and is ultimately what saves the family from disaster.

Some activities that have enabled Year 4 to explore this gripping text whilst developing their English literacy skills have included evaluating the orientation ('sizzling start'), contrasting the characters of Tilly and her Mum, discussing whose point of view the text is told from, sharing our understanding of what autism can look like, exploring the use of tone, volume and body language when communicating, creating tension in a narrative, considering situations from different perspectives, as well as building our vocabulary, strengthening our reading fluency and practising handwriting, all based on excerpts from this beautifully crafted narrative.


