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




Securing Success...

PREP NEWS

Loose part play in Prep

When you think back to your childhood and consider your favourite play experiences, what were the key elements? Was it the latest fad toy or gadget or was it the cardboard fridge box, the leftover building supplies or the items you gathered from the environment around you? For most people it's the last three items and these are the basis of what is known as loose parts play.

Loose parts play involves children using various found items to express their creativity and develop their imaginative and critical thinking skills.

Consider the children in the photos below.







They have collected rocks from around the yard (natural items) and began lining them up on the footpath. As the play progressed a story emerged: "We are blocking the road...there is a hole in the road and we don't want anyone to fall down it." As More children joined in, more rocks were collected and transported in wheelbarrows and on the back of the bikes. Leaves and bark were sprinkled on top, "It's the concrete to hold it all together." As they worked, conversation centred around what tools were needed. Someone suggested there was water on the road and this was why there was a hole. Pipes were collected from the sandpit road so that the water could drain away, Paint brushes were found to push back the dirt and bark from the side of the road so that they didn't block the drains. 6 or 7 children were involved in this activity, some stayed the whole time, and others came and went, however this child directed play utilised loose parts to build students communication and social skills, their critical thinking and problem solving skills, their awareness of space, size and shape. They worked together to develop a play narrative, to find solutions and to encourage and support each other.

The amount of learning that happened in this 40 minute play episode was deep and scaffolds further learning into the future - this was all possible because of the loose parts the students were able to find around the yard.

We are in the process of building our large loose parts to continue to allow students to develop their learning and skills through loose part play. If you are a tradesman who has any clean leftover items from jobs that may be useful to our play such as pallets, pipes, wood off-cuts, conduit reels, bricks or pavers, 1-1.5m branches or other building items, and would be happy to share them with us, please contact krisha.thomas@oags.nsw.edu.au It would be wonderful to see what the students can create with additional resources.

Stage 2 Camp Success

Last week, Stage 2 thoroughly enjoyed the experience of a 3-day CRU Camp in Galston, amongst the leafy backdrop of Berowra National Park, Sydney. Across the 3 days, students participated in a range of challenging, yet fun activities that not only allowed them to build connections with each other but also confidence in their growing independence level and resilience.

Students threw themselves into indoor rock climbing, learning survival skills in bushwalking, cooking damper, developing bike riding skills, team problem solving, archery, orienteering, low ropes and milk crate climbing whilst attached to harnesses. The wide variety of physical and social skills encompassed in the activities meant that all students were included and engaged. If that wasn't enough, students also enjoyed a mini Olympics, a strategy based outdoor wide game, night time Spotto and a big night of large group games.

The CRU leaders, all of whom love God as their Lord and Saviour, led us through a series of Christian discovery sessions, including engaging Bible talks, singing and small group discussion, focusing around the narrative of the gospel and Jesus being the true bread of life.

For some students this was their first experience of being away from the comfort of their own bed, mum and dad and the support that comes with this familiarity. Stage 2 showed ever growing independence during this camp and participated fully in each activity and embraced the entire camp experience. On the bus ride back to school, many students were already discussing what they hope they can do for next year's camp, and how much they didn't want to leave camp!

Our cattle team were absolutely on point showing for several local studs including The Trap Shorthorns, Elberta Limousins and Macquarie View Charolais with all our students impressing judge Nathan Leach in livestock, parading and junior judging events.

Our Year 7 team in the Young Farmers competition may not have been the biggest competitors in the field but for speed they couldn't be beaten, placing a very credible third against two teams of HSC students. We even had a Year 2 student, Mackenzie Flynn, who was part of one senior team doing her best to push a wool bale across the showground! In the Poultry section, Year 8 student Joshua King prepared the school Australorp bantams to perfection collecting a first and second in the junior soft feather division.

Down on the Farm

Autumn is a busy season for the Agriculture team at OAGS. From farm visits with Year 11 and 12, lambing, and the arrival of the new season trout for Year 7, it's been a very busy time.

The apple season is in full swing, and the combined senior agriculture class have completed a unit of work on the dramatic changes taking place in horticulture both in marketing and innovation. We have been privileged in being able to take part in a number of farm visits to Hillside Harvest where traditional farming has combined a niche tourism market to sell high quality fresh fruit. The students have also been to visit the Cunial farm featuring a high intensity trellised orchard utilising computer packing and platform picking.

Our meat lamb program was a huge success with all five lambs sold within minutes. The lambs were bred, raised and managed by Stage 5. Other products developed by students include gelato combining honey and home grown figs, meat chickens and our award winning OAGS mixed blossom honey.
