


Covid report

Primary School Report

Writing is an important skill that allows us to express ourselves and to share our ideas, thoughts and opinions with others. It is one of the most important things that children learn to do at school and throughout a child's educational journey, writing is the main way that a student's knowledge is assessed across all subject areas. However, the use of writing remains fundamentally important long after students leave the school gates; it is a life skill.

Children often start writing informally as soon as they can hold a pencil. The scribbles of a 3 year old are a first attempt at "writing" and often mimic the action of adults

around them. In primary school, reading and writing are closely linked. As children become more confident with their

phonemes (sounds), they begin to read and write basic sentences. By Stage 3, students are becoming much more proficient at writing their own texts to suit a particular purpose and audience.

You can encourage your child to develop their writing skills at home in a number of ways. Read to your child every day, regularly listen to them read to you and encourage them to write at every opportunity (eg cards, shopping lists, in a diary, creating short stories, writing emails etc). Also, model and encourage good oral



in different capacities.

language to support your child's development of correct grammar and word articulation.

Explicit writing instruction is a fundamental part of teaching in primary school and teachers are always looking for new and innovative ways to teach the strategies of writing. This term, Stage 1 has been carefully patrolling their written work to check for errors and mistakes. Mr Palmer, Mrs Simpson and Ms Taylor have deputised the students as **COPS** and have tasked them with

editing their work with a focus on the key components of good writing - Capitals, Organisation (planning), Punctuation and Spelling. These newly appointed COPS have the uniform sorted and are on the job, hunting down spelling mistakes, punctuation errors, poorly planned sentences and missing capital letters. The improvements are already noticeable, with many students enjoying being responsible for apprehending their own writing "baddies".



Stage 1 Teacher Spotlight - Mrs Carrie Simpson

Mrs Simpson joined the OAGS team at the start of 2022 and has quickly become a valued member of the primary school team. I recently asked Mrs Simpson a few questions to help the school community get to know her a bit better:

Also, students are familiar with Canvas, an online learning tool, where they access assessments and engage in course content.

A Weather Station Partnership: OAGS & Queensland University

On Friday 29th April Katie Buchhorn flew in from Queensland University. She is a Phd student in Mathematics and TedX Presenter who is sharing her research into extreme weather conditions with OAGS. The day began with Ms Buchhorn presenting a weather station to Mr Tim Brown at assembly. This will be placed in the new Agricultural Centre. Students will be able to excess data on wind, temperature, rain, humidity and pressure. As well as see how a real statistician uses such data to draw conclusions.



In period five, Katie Buchhorn presented her Ted talk based on a book she has written. In this talk she spoke how she used stepping stones in her life to achieve her goal of having a fulfilling life using Mathematics to solve real-world problems. She










Primary Pastoral Care - 7 Habits of Happy Kids



After a wonderful Term 1 learning about values in Pastoral Care, and in particular our school values of truth, excellence and service, we are excited to announce a new venture for Term 2 and beyond! Building on the foundation of values, we want our students (and ourselves!) to live principle-centred lives. Towards this end we will be introducing students to The 7 Habits for Happy Kids, a framework for living life based on timeless principles that help students to be able to lead themselves (independence) and to lead others (interdependence). The 7 habits were first identified by Dr Stephen Covey in 1989, through his book The 7 Habits for Highly Effective People and they have become a world-wide phenomenon in both business and education, though Dr Covey takes no credit for their existence stating they are timeless principles evident throughout history and across all cultures.

This term we will be focusing on the first 3 habits, beginning next week with **Habit 1: Be Proactive (You're in Charge)**. Students will be learning that we all have responsibility - the ability to choose our response. We may not always be able to control our circumstances, but we always have the freedom to choose our response to those circumstances. Being proactive also recognises that if we imagine something in our future, we need to be the ones to make that happen. It is the idea of 'act or be acted upon' encouraging students to take the initiative to make their future better, rather than waiting for others to do it.

We invite you to learn along with us! You may like to learn from your child by engaging them in conversations about what they are learning or you may even like to read the books or listen to the audiobook for yourself. This presents a wonderful opportunity for our school community to learn lifelong skills that will benefit them beyond their school days. I look forward to sharing more of the journey with you as we go.

Early Learning News

Speech and Language Development Information Session

Thank you to the families that join us for the information session on speech and language development on Tuesday night. It was very informative and Kathryn and Alison, from Orange Community Health, shared some very practical suggestions for supporting language development in the early years. They shared three key strategies that support language development. Firstly, **interactive reading**, this is not just reading to your child on a daily basis but engaging in reading with your child. Interactive reading is when your child is actively involved in answering and asking questions, making predictions or retelling the story, rather than passively listening to the text. Interactive reading strengthens your child's vocabulary, allows them to make connections between ideas and themes in different texts, as well as developing an understanding of the relationship between spoken and written words. The second strategy they shared to encourage language development was, **recasting**. Recasting is when the communication partner, you, repeats what your



child has said with more detail or with the correct grammar. For example, your child says, "Mummy home" and you respond with "Yes! Mummy is home!" or the child says, "want juice" and you respond, "I want more apple juice please!" Recasting is an effective way for children to hear more grammatically correct sentences and build their vocabulary. You need to balance recasting with encouraging your child to speak. So it is best not to recast each and every sentence. The third strategy shared for developing language skills was **pretend or imaginative play**. Research has shown that pretend and imaginative play is critical for developing oral language skills and has found that children who engage in pretend play often use higher forms of language than they would use in normal situations. Children who have language difficulties often find pretend play challenging. To engage in pretend play, choose settings that are of interest or familiar to your child, shopping, the cafe, school and set up the play environment together, be it using a box to imagine you are in a spaceship or a table with a cloth hanging over it to be a cave. The most important thing is to be a co player and a sensitive leader. Try your best to not comment on things beyond the imaginative play scene or to see this as an opportunity to redirect to teaching. Be playful, have fun and be in the moment.

If you have questions or concerns about your child's speech or language development, the advice from Kathryn and Alison was to make an appointment with Orange Community Health or another speech pathologist and have your child's hearing tested. Their message was if you have concerns, they would rather you made the appointment and were reassured after meeting with you and your child, that things are developing normally, or if needed, therapy put into place therapy early rather than waiting.

Speech and language development have a big impact on your child's educational journey and is something we can work on in partnership.

The unit has received much praise from local dignitaries as well as the public and the RSL for our growing numbers, their dress and behaviour on

the day. Our cadets stood and sat patiently during the Memorial Service in Robertson Park. This has also led to many inquiries about joining.

Bunnings BBQ - After the Anzac morning we had agreed to conduct the Bunnings BBQ to raise funds for unit purchases. This meant a very long day after attending the morning Dawn Services and city March then working from 1pm till 6pm. My thanks to the tireless efforts of LT Russell Player and Mr Aaron Wright for their organisation and cooking plus the 9 cadets that volunteered to assist. After expenses we raised over \$400.

Consistent Growth. From our humble beginnings in 2019 through 2 years dominated by Covid, 252 ACU has now become a major force. Based on the Cadetnet statistics at the start of April, we are now the largest unit in 25 Battalion (western NSW) and the 6th largest community (non-school) ACU in the NSW/ACT region. This is an incredible achievement and the broader cadet organisation and other units are now looking at the initiatives we have used to try to generate growth.

Thank you to those parents that have paid their fee invoices promptly. This will now enable the purchase of several items of equipment to improve and enhance our training and logistics onsite as well as in the field.

The unit will hold a Leadership training day on Sunday 15 May. Identified cadets (based on attendance, age, behaviour) in years 8-10 will be approached to attend. The day will prepare cadets for promotion to LCPL. Please note that attendance satisfies one requirement for promotion but does mean cadets will be promoted immediately. Promotions occur when there are vacancies and it is considered the individual cadet is ready to progress. It would be normal to prepare cadets for promotion during their second year (or in year 9 and 10) but this is flexible according to the needs of the unit and the maturity of the individual cadet.

Alpacas on Show

The last month has been an eventful one for the OAGS Alpaca Team. During the term break the team of ten students and five alpacas travelled to the Sydney Royal Easter Show to compete in the Young Paraders competition. There are two components to a Paraders competition. In the Stockmanship class competitors must demonstrate their ability to work with their alpaca through a number of challenges that replicate situations found on the farm. These could include moving through gates, across different surfaces and moving the animals in different ways (backing up,




pivoting or moving sideways). In the Showmanship section students are required to

demonstrate their knowledge of the animals, fleece and husbandry practices. This was the first competition for many of our students and alpacas and they were in a large class of about 30 competitors.
