We were welcomed to camp with beautiful weather and 90 very excited Stage 2 students and teachers.




Across the 3 days the students participated in a range of activities that not only allowed them to build connections with each other but also confidence in their growing independence levels and resilience.


For some students this was their first experience of being away from the comfort of their own bed, mum and dad and the support that comes with this familiarity. Stage 2 showed ever growing independence during this camp and participated fully in each activity and embraced the entire camp experience. On the bus ride back to school many students were already discussing what they hope they can do for next year's camp, and how much they didn't want to leave camp!











Recruiting. It has been encouraging to see 42 new students attend on Monday 14 Feb and almost the same number on 21Feb. Many of them are in the process of registering as an Army cadet. Please note that until the cadetnet online application process has been completed they are not officially on the books or part of the AAC program. As our numbers now far exceed our Authorised Establishment, next Monday 28 Feb will be the last opportunity to attend (until our next recruit intake in Term 3) unless the online application process has commenced.

Fees. OAGS Parents have the option of having the Cadet Fee (\$150 one off payment on joining) and the Term fee (currently \$60) added to their school account. Alternatively you can pay (like non-OAGS families) directly into the 252 ACU account by EFTPOS or credit card on a Monday afternoon. Banking details of the account can be supplied on request.

Return of Clothing. We have been advised that the Army is unable to supply more DPCU uniforms as they are no longer being manufactured due to the planned changeover to the AMCU uniform. This fact coupled with our large recruit numbers make it <u>urgent</u> that students who have left the cadet program return their clothing and equipment asap to allow us to clothe the students who want to be members of the cadet program.

Bivouac 4-6 March (Marrangaroo Army Camp - Lithgow). This is for pre 2022 cadets only. Consent notes must be returned by 28Feb to allow transport to be booked.

2-3 April Recruit Induction & Biv. New recruits will be issued uniforms and receive training on radios, fieldcraft, cook and eat ration packs, plus camp overnight at school in tents and hutchies. More details will be provided in the coming weeks.

Adult helpers. For 252 ACU to continue to accept all the students that wish to experience the Army cadet program we need more adults to help. AAC policy requires 1 new adult staff for every 20 cadets. Currently we are 18 cadets over our approved ceiling (without including new recruits). I am unable to gain approval to further enlarge without more adult helpers. Unfortunately due to my impending retirement from the ADF (and therefore loss of my position on the NSW AAC HQ), I will no longer be able to "shield" 252 ACU from this staffing policy. It would be very disappointing if we were forced to turn away interested students due to insufficient adult staff. Adult helpers do not need to be parents of cadets or have any prior cadet or military knowledge or experience. If you or anyone you know can help, please contact me.

Primary Pastoral Care - Our New Referral Process

Proverbs provide wonderful wisdom for living out general principles for life. In the Bible we find that Proverbs 22:6 says, "**Train** a child in the way s/he should go and when s/he is old s/he will not depart from it." While this is not a promise, this principle offers us all great wisdom as we raise children in the partnership of home and school.

Through our pastoral care of students at school, we put an emphasis on training the character of children, which is shown in the outworkings of their behaviour. As one small part of this training, we have implemented a new referral system of behaviour that seeks to both celebrate behaviours that come from character strength, and correct behaviour that comes from character traits that still need refining. The Bible's wisdom informs us that we all make mistakes at times but that we all have great value and strength despite our failings.

This week, our new referral system has been explained to students **so that our expectations** are clear. Clear expectations are an important factor in effective learning. We believe that it is important for you as parents and carers to understand it too, as it will assist you in understanding various referral processes that your child might experience here at school. You may be contacted at any point along the referral process as we are strong believers in keeping communication lines open as we partner in raising children to be the best they can be.

Our model seeks to give a general overview of our system and to give a guide to our school community about examples of behaviour at each stage. It does not (and cannot!) be specific about every type of behaviour in every context. The model can be viewed via https://doi.org/10.1001/jhis.link.



Food Focus

In a first for OAGS, a group of Year 11 students are studying Food Technology as part of their HSC. This amazing class has been busy at work studying the Historical Changes of food availability in Australia, with a particular focus on food equity and the impact of migration on our current food choices and availability. As part of the course, students are required to plan, prepare and present a range of dishes which reflect the study topics. Last week, as part of studying the topic 'staple foods around the world' the students were allocated a staple food product and had to research where the product originated from and where it is commonly used today. They were also required to plan, prepare and present a dish using this ingredient. The group produced some wonderful dishes such as Cassava Mozzarella Balls (Brazil), fresh tortillas made from maize (Mexico), and flour and sorghum pancakes (Sudan). This week, the class focused on Native Australian produce and Bush Tucker. They were tasked with influsing Indigenous ingredients into contemporary Australian cuisine. Students planned, prepared and presented a



range of dishes including Kangaroo and Mango Curry with Macadamia flat bread, Kangaroo meatballs with Bush tomato relish and lemon myrtle melting moments. Next week, students will be preparing historical dishes which represent their heritage with the task of plating the dishes for the modern Australian family.

Congratulations Hallie, and thank you to those who donated. The fundraising page is still open for those who wish to donate to the Kids with Cancer Foundation.










STEM at OAGS

Science

Our year 12 physics class has started the year off electromagnetism. Students studying investigating the behaviour of electric charges in magnetic fields. Using a Rumkoff induction coil connected to a cathode ray tube, they generated 15,000V to create a moving beam of electrons. With powerful rare earth magnets students could see how the beam of electrons was influenced by a magnetic field. This mechanism of accelerating



electrons using high voltages is used in the medical industry to produce X-rays and in radiation for cancer treatment. Year 12 have enjoyed the practical aspects of radiography that this unit of study has provided.







Engineering

Secondary students have been developing their entries for the Fluor Engineering Challenge. This is a global

competition where students upload a video of their engineering creations. This year's challenge is to build a ball run that will slow a ping pong ball down the most when dropped from a height of 25cm, only using paper and tape. Students are experimenting with varying angles of inclination of ramps, dissipating momentum through obstacles, using static friction and increasing the distance the ball travels with funnels in order to maximise their score. I congratulate students for their hard work in this challenge and their growing understanding of physics and problem solving skills that come from their participation.







Year 12 maths students are studying the mathematics of long jump for their Vectors in Motion unit. Students are using digital technology to film the mechanics of their jump and deriving their individual equations of motion using integration and


calculus. Students are then applying their understanding of projectile motion and acceleration due to gravity to determine how far they



could jump on another planet in the solar system. Keegan, one of 10 our year

students volunteered his athletic ability for analysis. The students calculated that if Keegan was to long jump on the planet Pluto, he could jump 26.85m, tripling the current world record.

School Student Travel Term 1 2022



School student travel information for parents and students

School Travel Passes

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local</u> bus operator to discuss their travel needs.

New Student Opal cards (including new Term Bus Passes) will be sent to the student's nominated postal address within two weeks of their application being approved.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.


Terms of Use

Students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the Opal terms of use.

All students are required to comply with the <u>Student code of conduct</u>. The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.
